

2020 Veterans Day Digital Content Contest Teacher's Guide- HIGH SCHOOL

2020 Theme: "Women in the Military"

The mission of the Clovis Veterans Memorial District (CVMD) is to 'Provide a permanent living memorial honoring U.S. Military and Veterans; provide facilities and support programs to promote a legacy of service for preserving our community's and country's foundational ideals. Veterans Day is an opportunity to honor and give thanks to those who have served or are serving in the military, those who preserve the American way of life.

The resources included in this Teacher's Guide can be used to talk to your class about the history of Veterans Day and introduce them to this year's theme: "Women in the Military"

History of Veterans Day:

Veterans Day is held on November 11th, which began as a celebration of peace after World War I ended. It was originally called Armistice Day, to celebrate the truce signed between America and Germany during World War I. In 1954 the name was changed to Veterans Day, to honor all veterans.

History of Women in the Military

Women have been serving their nation for hundreds of years- serving as laundresses, cooks, and nurses during the Revolutionary War. They ensured camps were taken care of in the Civil War and a few brave women even enlisted under male names and hid their gender to serve the United States of America. In 1901 Congress established the Army Nurse Corps, and in 1908 established the Navy Nurse Corps, the first formal recognition of women serving in the military. During World War II approximately 400,000 women served in non-combat roles. In 1948 Congress passed the Women's Armed Service Integration Act, permitting women to serve as permanent members of the military, whereas prior they were only allowed to serve during war times. Since then, there have been many achievements made by women in the military, and their ability to integrate into military culture is still growing with the Department of Defense opening all combat jobs to women in 2016.

Importance of Women in the Military

As this year marks the 100th Anniversary of the 19th amendment which allows women the right to vote, the District wanted to honor the women who have paved the way in the military and the service they provide our nation. The role of women in the military has changed greatly in the last 100 years, from primarily assisting with keeping camps feed and nursing duties, to having our first woman command a United States Army infantry division- Major General Laura L. Yeager. Women have made an impact on all aspects of the military and continue to do so today!

Starting a conversation...

Introduce Veterans Day to your students, and the importance of women in the military and recognizing the service they give to our nation.

Discuss with the students

- What does it mean to be a Veteran?
- What were the roles of women in during World War I and World War II?
- How have the roles of women changed in the military overtime?
- Which notable woman in the military stands out to you and why?
- How can we celebrate women in the military?
